



PROGRAM UPDATES

K-9 UNIT DEPLOYMENT AND TRAINING:

Officer Brian Stolt and his partner Zeus are certified in Narcotics and as a Patrol Dog. The K-9 Unit was deployed 40 times in 2011. The K-9 Unit spent nearly 28 hours on deployments. Zeus took part in 20 arrests out of the 40 deployments.



The K-9 Unit training is ongoing. In 2011, nearly 110 hours were spent on training. Training consists of Aggression/Apprehension work, Obedience, Searching, Detection of Narcotics and miscellaneous other training.

The K-9 Unit is a vital tool in the continued fight against crimes and drugs. Zeus is a great asset for agencies to have available to them in the fight. Zeus is the only dog trained and certified in both Patrol and Narcotics within our County. Our K-9 Unit is one of only four total K-9 Units in Scott County.

RESERVE OFFICER UNIT:

It's been a busy year for the Jordan Police Departments Reserve Unit. As a whole the reserve unit has dedicated 2,459 hours to the citizens of this community. Currently Officers Jonathan Wamsley and Charles Crohn is assigned as the Reserve Unit Coordinator's. The Reserve Unit is currently composed of 21 Officers, 14 of which are male and 7 female. In 2011 Reserve Officer Beuch was promoted to a Part-time Police Officer within our department. Congratulations to Officer Beuch! We continue to attract many qualified applicants for open positions within the Reserve Unit.

Currently there are two Reserve Officers are on approved leave of absences. One is for personal reasons and the other is serving with our military in Iraq.

The Reserve Unit continues to work very hard for the citizens of Jordan. They provide security at all the Jordan football games and the high school and middle school dances. They provide security for the car cruise / Heimatfest, Pork in the Park, a Night to Unite, the Jordan Art Festival, and provide traffic control for motorcycle runs and bicycles runs as well as other events that come through the city. Our Reserve Officers are very quick to respond to the immediate needs of our Police Department when called upon in emergency situations. Additionally, they have also donated many hours in assisting our records staff.

Our Reserve Unit attends continuing education training every year. They recertify in Use of Force, Taser training and other training that's available! The Employees of the Jordan Police Department continue to enjoy working with and helping to mold these young Officers into the Police Officers of our future.

DARE PROGRAM:

In 2011, the DARE program was removed from the school as budgeting and staff issues arose. The DARE program will be brought back in the beginning of February 2012 when Officers Schultz and Strack will be teaching DARE to both the 5th and 6th grade classes. This will ensure that all of our students will have had the opportunity to participate in the 9 week program.



NATIONAL NIGHT OUT:

No matter what a neighborhood calls this evening, neighborhoods throughout Jordan again in 2011 joined together to:

- Heighten crime and drug prevention awareness.
- Generate support for, and participation in local anti-crime programs.
- Strengthen neighborhood spirit and police-community partnerships.
- Send a message to criminals letting them know that neighborhoods are organized and fighting back.



PREDATORY OFFENDER REGISTRATION/ TRACKING:


The State of Minnesota requires that we register and track sex offenders living in our community. Currently we have a small number of offenders living in our community. Offenders are assigned a “threat level” of either I, II or III. Level III, is the most likely to re-offend, Level I being the least likely to re-offend. All of the registered offenders currently residing within our city are assigned as Level I offenders. Sgt. Empey and Officer Schultz are working with the offenders on a routine basis.

COMMUNITY VOUCHER PROGRAM:

The Jordan Police Department maintains a voucher program which helps the needy. This program provides for basic needs for an individual until they can get in touch with long term help. Examples might include a night or two at a local motel, a hot meal, medicine for children, a tank of gas, etc. The funding for this program is donated monies and is administered by the Chief of Police.

JORDAN AREA FOOD SHELF:

The Jordan Police Department works hand in hand with the Jordan Area Food Shelf to feed the hungry in our community. The Chief of Police Serves as the Assistant Director and Treasurer. The staff at the Jordan Police Department has volunteered their time and talents in a variety of different ways to show their support to the Jordan Area Food Shelf. These means of support have ranged from working volunteer hours when the food shelf is open, picking up donations, and dropping off donations to name a few.



ALCOHOL AWARENESS SERVER TRAINING:

In 2011, Officer Schultz provided 14 classes to persons who are employed at a licensed establishment within Jordan City Limits. Per city ordinance, the class is geared to make bartenders aware of the responsibilities they take on by serving alcohol to those over 21 years of age, and to make them aware of the consequences of serving those under the age of 21. The class also aids in identifying false ID's and resources to verify an ID in question.

SAFE AND SOBER / OPERATION NIGHT CAP:



Scott County continues to receive funding for overtime shifts to support saturation details focusing on DWI enforcement and Seatbelt enforcement. In addition to 2011, 2012 extra DWI patrols within 13 counties with highest combined totals of alcohol-related deaths and serious injuries will be the focus area. Alcohol-related crashes in these counties accounted for nearly half of the state's total during the last three years: Anoka, Carver, Dakota, Hennepin, Olmsted, Ramsey, Rice, St. Louis, Scott, Sherburne, Stearns, Washington, and Wright.

SAFE AND SOBER / OPERATION NIGHT CAP (continued):

Whereas previously the safe and Sober and nightcap events were separately funded and administrated, they have now been combined under one administrative source. All future overtime enforcement saturations formally known as “safe and sober” or “night cap” will be referred to as Toward Zero Deaths (TZD) saturations.

TOWARDS ZERO DEATHS:

On Minnesota roadways, one traffic fatality is too many; in 1990 there were 568 Traffic Fatalities, in 2011 there were 365. Toward Zero Deaths (TZD) is a Minnesota partnership led by the Department of Public Safety, the Department of Transportation, and the Department of Health, in cooperation with the Minnesota State Patrol, the Federal Highway Administration, Minnesota county engineers, and the Center for Transportation Studies at the University of Minnesota.

The Jordan Police Department does attend an annual conference held by TZD to share and hear new ideas and upcoming ways to promote safety on our roadways. Personnel from the Jordan Police department that have attended the conference included: Safe and Sober/Night Cap Coordinator, and previously Child Passenger Safety Technician.

Statistically the joint efforts of all the parties involved have had a significant impact on enforcement throughout our state proven by the continued dropped death rate in Minnesota.



CALLS FOR SERVICE BREAKDOWN

LOCATION

Jordan Police Department responded to 3707 incidents for the year of 2011. Grid 105 historically and currently generates the highest amount of calls for service for our department. Grid 105 includes the Jordan Police Station and calls taken at the station. The calls taken at the station include but are not limited to background checks, information received, assisting other agencies and like calls.

In 2011, 420 of the 1002 calls for service were created at the Jordan Police Department. This leaves 582 calls for service to the downtown area.

In 2010, 457 of the 776 calls for service were created at the Jordan Police Department. This leaves 319 calls for service to the downtown area.

In 2006, 607 of the 872 calls for service were created at the Jordan Police Department. This leaves 265 calls for service to the downtown area. In 2006 the Jordan Police Department did a large number of breath tests for persons required to be on monitoring programs as required by sentencing requirements. The county has developed a new monitoring system that no longer requires local agencies to assist in this process.

In 2001, 303 of the 1004 calls for service were created at the Jordan Police Department. This leaves 701 calls for service to the downtown area.

TRAFFIC STATISTICS
