Programs

K-9 Unit



K-9 Zeus and Officer Stolt are a certified patrol and narcotics detection K-9 team. They are used to locate missing people, apprehend fleeing suspects, and to locate illegal drugs.



Zeus is also a big hit at public relations events like National Night Out, Safety Camp, Celebrate Jordan, and the Kindergarten demo day.

Police Reserve Unit



The Jordan Police Reserve Unit consists of 20 dedicated men and women who volunteer their time to assist the department at community events such as Heimatfest, parades, several annual “run / bike” events, etc. In exchange these officers gain valuable experience as part of a law enforcement organization. This year the Jordan Police Reserve Unit donated 1,853 hours to our city.

The **Take it to the Box** program offers residents a convenient way to safely dispose of unused prescription and over-the-counter medications.

Jordan residents can drop off unused medications -- including prescription, over-the-counter, and pet medications, as well as liquid medications in leak-proof containers, and illegal drugs and drug paraphernalia.

Safety Camp

Life Link Helicopter is always a big hit at the Jordan Police Department Safety Camp. Children who attend the camp receive instruction in electricity safety, water safety, bike safety, animal safety, and fire safety.

Kindergarten Day



Each year the Police, Fire, and EMS, and Sheriff's Water Patrol spend a morning with the kindergarten classes. This contact is very educational for the children and provides them an opportunity to meet public safety workers in a positive environment. This contact should help them feel more at ease and familiar with responding personnel should there be contact in a real life emergency situation.

Community Education



School Resource Officers / DARE

The Jordan Police Department has two full time officers who work in the schools on a part time basis. These SROs (School Resource Officers) teach DARE and several other classes to our youth.

In addition these officers provide crosswalk duties before and after school, provide security at school dances, football games, and prom.

Snowmobile Safety

The Jordan Police Department teams with the Belle Plaine Police Department and the Scott County Sheriff's Office to certify over 100 youth each year in snowmobile safety. This year the class was taught to 124 children from several area communities.



Alcohol

The Jordan Police Department teaches the Minnesota Alcohol Server class to all individuals who seek employment in area bars and convenience stores that sell alcoholic beverages. By ordinance all servers must be certified before employment.
