FROM YOUR CHIEF OF POLICE

This has been a year of significant change within our department marked by the retirement of longtime and successful Chief of Police Robert Malz. With Chief Malz's retirement came a major reorganization within our department.

On June 1, 2014 I assumed the position of Chief of Police. Shane Schultz earned a promotion from Patrol Officer to Sergeant and Jacob Rudolph earned a promotion from Patrol Officer to Detective. We hired two (2) full-time Police Officers; Angie Otto our first full-time female Police Officer, and David Culpepper to replenish our patrol ranks. We also hired our first Police Officer of Hispanic descent, Rodrigo Gomez-Lopez to a part-time position.

I'm proud of how our Police Department as a whole and how our staff individually have responded throughout our reorganization. I believe each of us has remained steadfastly committed to providing our citizens with professional, efficient, fair, impartial, and dedicated police services.

Our department believes in and remains committed to policing through a Community – Orientated philosophy. Our Officers continue to occupy satellite offices within our schools as result of the School Safety Initiative implemented by Chief Malz. We also partnered with the Jordan School District this past summer to dedicate Officer Strack on Fridays solely to School Resource Officer (SRO) duties for the 2014-2015 school year.

Reported crimes in our City remain exceptionally low and decreased slightly year over year. We experienced and investigated 336 overall crimes in 2014 compared to 357 crimes in 2013. Non-criminal complaints to our department increased by slightly more than 100 contacts from 2013 to 2014. As our City continues to expand in population and business, I expect an increasing effect on both the criminal and non-criminal complaints received by our Police Department in coming years. We will continue to do our very best to be proactive, to thoroughly investigate and solve crimes, and to educate our citizens regarding ways to protect themselves from crime in an effort to keep our crime rate as low as possible.

In closing, I believe our Police Department is strong, as strong as it has ever been. However with that said, we will always seek out new and innovative programs, grant funding sources, and unique training opportunities to strive for professional improvement for our individual staff members and the department alike.


